This is a collection of anecdotes, stories, memories and images gathered from Coventry and Warwickshire residents who lived through the 1970's.

This scrapbook is the outcome of a community arts and heritage project, supported by The Heritage Lottery Fund.

Through a collaboration between Arts Uplift and Sonrisa Arts, we aimed to capture the heritage of a generation who grew up in the 1970's. In Summer 2023, we ran a series of participatory workshops across the local Coventry and Warwickshire community, using music, dance and 1970's memorabilia to inspire memories and discussion.

Six workshops were led by a professional dance artist and a professional musician in; 2 care homes, 2 Age UK Friendship groups, a dementia cafe and an assisted living scheme across Coventry and Warwickshire.

We want to share these memories with you before they become lost, so that we can preserve and celebrate our history for future generations.

Take a step back in time to a decade of highs and lows, innovation and challenge, music, fashion and faux pas.



"In 74, I was 14 & we were allowed to go to Birmingham by ourselves on the bus"


"Paper round kids"

'I used to live in an estate and there was a brook at the end and we used to play in it, the farmer let us play in the ditch"




"Not having a lot to play with having to amuse yourselves"





'We went to the Bernie Inn for a meal out"


"Babysham and a hip flask."







"Going on holiday to Bournemouth, I went with close family and friends. I enjoyed swimming in the sea, walking around the cliffs. They went rock climbing, played football and bowls"



"I remember riding pillion as a passanger, my boyfriend had a new bike. I never told my mother and we didn't wear crash helmets in those days.

We used to go to Blackpool and Morcombe and I loved it!"



"We went for long walks over the fields taking a picnic with us and staying out for hours. Great family time - going on an adventure." Find the skateboard factory and I used to the skateboard factory and I used to the skateboard in Scarborough and it cost me £150 which was a lot of money then and it was called an Alleycat with yellow wheels on a black board.

"I started work as a GC engineer. I Brought a 3 bedroom house for £2300, the interest was 16%"

"In the early 70's I worked for Pye Records in London as a receptionist. I met many artists including; The Kinks, Status Quo, Sandy Shaw, Helen Shamiro, Pickerty Witch, Donovan, David Bowie, Mungo Gerry and many more. The one who made my heart beat fast was Roger Moore, who was visiting ATU Television (Pye was a subsiduary) Roger was doing the Pursuaders at the time. Our boss, Louis Benjamin was also head of Moss Empires who handled lots of big theatres in London including the London Paladium and we often got free tickets to shows. I was wined and dined many times."



"I worked at Butlins in Pwllheli, it was a madhouse! I was a chalet maid. We had 45 beds to do a day and then I would go to Barnsley for my 2 days off."




